Bench to Biotech UC Discovery Fellow: Kathryn Nguyen

"I have decided to be unemployed," Kathryn Nguyen had told friends over lunch.

Nguyen had wished to transition into the business side of San Diego's biotechnology industry after receiving her PhD degree in Biomedical Sciences from the School of Medicine at UCSD. Though she excelled at

marketing classes through UCSD extension, co-chaired the public relations and marketing committee for the Association of Women in Science, San Diego (AWIS-SD) and was instrumental in forming a

strategic alliance between UCSD extension and AWIS-SD, she struggled to find the right path and convince, as she says, "someone to give me a chance."

As Nguyen sat looking toward unemployment, one of her friends suggested applying for the UC Discovery Fellowships. The fellowship is a professional development program to provide leadership in building diverse linkages between research and California R&D economy. Nguyen's interest was sparked. In three days, she completed a proposal, found a UCSD mentor, and submitted her application.

That was one year ago. Today, Nguyen has been preparing a business plan in the first phase of her Discovery Fellowship as Director of Bench to Biotech at UC San Diego, Office of the President. Her goal is to integrate the School of Medicine, the Skaggs School of Pharmacy, and the Rady School of Management with San Diego's robust R&D industry. Nguyen's main goals are to provide educational programs to graduate students and postdoctoral fellows in bio-business, to establish internship initiatives with local industry, and to build collaborative networks between scholars and professionals.

In this phase of the fellowship, "my job is to listen," says Nguyen. She meets continuously with key leaders in industry and university heads, travels frequently to the other UC campuses to study successful university programs, and continues to engage in biobusiness related courses. "I spend a lot of time studying models." One model that has captured Nguyen's interest is the \$50K Entrepreneur Competition. The student run UCSD competition has been successful in raising money and fostering partnerships between students and local entrepreneurs.

In the second phase of her fellowship, to begin in September, Nguyen will spend a year implementing her business plan. The key to success, she believes, is "to have the tenacity to wedge into the system and tap into an unmet need."

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Pharmatek Open House

On November 20th, 2007, AWIS members were treated with eggplant parmigiana at the Pharmatek Open House event. Pharmatek is a contract research organization dedicated to a client-centered approach to lead selection and formulation. Founded in 1999, Pharmatek refers to this process as scientific counseling. "There's a lot of science, a little bit of luck, and the right people," Jane Myer, Director of Business Development explains. Researchers process compounds from when they enter the development process until they are ready to ship to the clinic. "If you train people properly, they can do all of this."

In their current building off of Miramar road in San Diego, Pharmatek has six custom-built suites dedicated to contract manufacturing. Pharmatek currently has about 75 employees and enjoys a low turnover rate; a few employees leave every year to seek further education. Pharmatek has over 100 clients, over half of which are in the San Diego area. Pharmatek is also expanding its client base and hopes to serve clients worldwide.

An enthusiastic guide leads attendants through Pharmatek's suites. An employee-driven environment is evident in the hand drawn cartoons in the corners of the white boards and the Lego figure guarding the tech room. Part of this camaraderie may be due to the vast array of company-sponsored social events, from golf tournaments and a softball team to pumpkin carving contests. Per employee request, a large lunchroom was built into the most recent Pharmatek building so that more employees could eat together.

Building Leadership Skills

Qualities of Good Leaders (adapted from Realtor Magazine online):

- Make difficult decisions
- Take risks and act courageously

- Motivate others
- Build teams and pull the best out of all members
- Know your strengths and weaknesses
- Have integrity
- Continually learn and be open to new ideas
- Communicate effectively with a variety of people
- Be vitally interested in other people's success

At the December strategy session, AWIS members gathered to learn about leadership. Four women who are leaders from the San Diego area talked about their experiences and what they felt made a good leader.

Lynne Friedmann, a freelance science writer, began college at 27 due to the encouragement of a mentor. "When I'm 90 years old, I'll still rely on mentors." Lynne has assumed leadership roles in the National Association of Science Writers, the UCSD Athena Program, and AWIS, both at the San Diego and at the national level. "Don't be afraid of failure. You learn from failure."

Tammy Dwyer, Ph.D., is the chair of chemistry and biochemistry at the University of San Diego. She stressed the importance of integrity. "Followers are important for being a leader... Followers have to be able to trust you."

Karen Zeh, Ph.D., then president of AWIS-San Diego, encouraged audience members to become involved in AWIS as a way to gain experience in leadership. She added that good leaders need to "know when to step back."

Joanzy Zeltinger, Ph.D., the vice president for scientific affairs at REVA Medical, encouraged audience members to learn from those around them. "The good, the bad, the ugly. Learn from all three." She also stressed that there are several key points that women can learn from their male counterparts, mainly to delegate, negotiate, and to ask for help when it's needed.

All four speakers provided excellent examples of good leaders and encouraged the audience to seek out leadership positions of their own.

Strategy Session Finds the Right Fit

On February 11th, AWIS members cogitated on one of the perennial questions faced by working professionals--is my job a good fit for me? The Strategy Session, entitled "Finding the Right Fit for Right Now: Match Your Career to your Professional and Personal Strengths," divided this complex issue into four categories:

- Interests
- Knowledge/ Skills and Ability
- Personality
- Values

The idea was that for a job to feel fully satisfying, it should be a good match in all of these areas.

It is perhaps obvious that you must be interested in the work, and be qualified to do it, in order to fully enjoy your job. But it is easy to neglect the importance of personality and values for job satisfaction. For example, if you are very people-oriented, you are unlikely to be content working independently at a bench all day--you may prefer

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working in a team. But how can you find out what your personalitytype is? We discussed several common personality tests, including Holland's codes and the Myers-Briggs, both of which can be taken for free online. Both of these tests can be used to gain insight into your personality, and even to suggest specific careers that might match it.

Values can also be a crucial factor in job satisfaction. The speaker gave the example of a physicist searching for a job in industry, who was determined to avoid working for defense contractors "making death rays." Similarly, one participant said she wouldn't be happy working for a pharmaceutical company making "me-too" drugs, copies of effective drugs already on the market. Values also extend beyond the purpose of the work to factors like whether the job provides sufficient independence, monetary compensation, or time for family.

The overall message of the workshop seemed to be that there were no "good jobs", but merely good matches between a job and the individual in it. Therefore, the first step to finding happiness at work is to gain some insight about yourself--what you like, what you are good at, what kind of person you are, and what you value. Only after reaching this self-understanding can you attempt to improve the fit of your job to your nature, or if necessary to find a new job that fits better.
