# AWIS Scholarships: An Update on Past Winners By Kerri Hebard-Massey

Every year, AWIS-San Diego awards scholarships to women from local schools. From community college through graduate school, awards are open to any woman in pursuit of a degree in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics. The awards are presented at the Women in Science and Technology (WIST) conference,

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formerly called Women in bioScience conference. AWIS-San Diego caught up with several former winners:

Sharon Matsuoka is majoring in mathematics at California State University, San Marcos. She is busy tutoring 4-5 students in math each week, taking 7 classes, and planning to graduate this term. After graduation, she plans to get her teaching credentials and teach high school math and Spanish.

Anna Siebers is a Biochemistry/Chemistry major at the University of California, San Diego. Anna thought that "the most memorable part of the Women in bioScience conference was meeting other well accomplished and motivated women studying science. It was amazing to hear other girls' plans for the future and to meet with older women scientists and hear their perspectives about academic research." After graduation, Anna plans to spend a year or two teaching, possibly with Teach for America, before pursuing an advanced degree. Last year, she developed a student cooking show for UCSD TV. Though the station has now closed, she hopes to continue cooking and teaching others. "Maybe I'll even apply to be on the Food Network or open my own restaurant some day!" she says.

Amanda Lewis received an AWIS scholarship in 2005. Since then, she has finished her doctoral work in Biological Sciences and continued onto a postdoctoral position in a collaborator's lab. She is now interviewing for faculty positions and hopes to stay within academia. As a mother of two small children, Amanda offers this suggestion: "If I could give a single piece of advice to young women in science who want a family too, it is this- put yourself in situations (i.e. labs/jobs) where you see women with children succeeding."

We congratulate these women and all our past scholarship winners on their success and look forward to meeting the new scholarship winners at this year's WIST conference.

# Round-table discussion with Dr. Phoebe Leboy: Why so Low? Roadblocks to More Women Faculty in Science and Engineering"

Dr. Phoebe Leboy, Professor Emeritus of Biochemistry at the University of Pennsylvania and current National President of AWIS, met with women scientists from all levels on Feb 5<sup>th</sup> in an event organized by UCSD's association of Women in Science and Engineering (WISE), and GradWISE.

Dr. Leboy showed that there is a disparity between the number of women getting PhDs and the number of women being hired as junior faculty, and these disparities are field-dependent. The worst disparities are found in Biology and Biomedical Sciences, where women have been earning ~40-45% of PhDs for the past 20 years, yet only 20-30% of tenure track positions are held by women. In Physics and Engineering only ~20% of women earn PhDs, but the number of women getting to tenure track positions is not as disparate as that found in the Biology and Biomedical fields.



A quote from one of Dr. Leboy's slides illustrates the problem:

"Our struggle today is not to have a female Einstein get appointed as an assistant professor. It is for a woman schlemiel to get as quickly promoted as a male schlemiel."

Bella Abzug (American Congresswoman and leader in the women's movement)

Dr. Leboy cited the following problems as preventing women from pursuing an academic track career:

- Emphasis on the quantity instead of the quality of published papers
- High stress and a highly competitive environment
- Chilly and isolated climate in science
- Difficulty doing the "big science" encouraged by funding institutions
- Strenuous work schedules- 12+ hour days that ignore weekends and holiday

The bottom line seems to be that the world of academic science was created by and for men, with an emphasis on competition and entrepreneurship that is not widely appealing to many women.

So what can we do about it? "We have to confront it head on," said Dr. Leboy. The system itself needs to change, from policies established by funding agencies down to the local administration of research centers. Recent advances, such as new regulations for maternity leave and tenure clock, have improved the environment for women in science, but more needs to be done. Finally, the importance of good mentorship was emphasized for women at the end of graduate school: a good postdoctoral mentor will help them advance their careers and encourage and support them in pursuing the academic track.

# **Strategy Sessions**

There were about 25 people in attendance and everyone had a great deal of fun with the session. We all agreed that bringing out and expressing our creativity will benefit our personal, as well as our professional lives.

The first strategy session of 2009 focused on speed networking. We all know the importance of networking but often find that our attempts at it are not as successful as we had hoped they would be. There were 47 attendees making it one of our larger sessions. The session opened with an explanation of "speed networking": a series of brief, sequential introductions or interviews, and a demonstration of how to prepare an "elevator speech": a personal statement meant to start a conversation and generate interest, but not to describe yourself in full. This was followed by five 5-minute speed networking sessions during which partners exchanged business cards and shared their information with each other. Everyone left feeling that they had learned a great deal and were confident that future networking opportunities would be successful.

Strategy sessions are an interactive forum for professional and personal development held on the first Monday of every second month from 6-8 pm at Biogen Idec. In addition to providing the opportunity to network (we all know how important this can be), the sessions tend to be informative and enjoyable. The topics vary from session to session and attendance is open to all AWIS members.
