AWIS and Girl Scouts Create High School Mentoring Program

The AWIS-SD Education Outreach committee, in cooperation with the San Diego-Imperial County Girl Scouts, will launch a mentor program for high school students beginning early in 1998. AWIS member and Girl Scouts program coordinator, Felicia Eaves, had previously identified AWIS members interested in mentoring or volunteering with the girl scouts in science activities. The AWIS-SD mentor program takes its mission statement from the AWIS National mentor program: "AWIS believes that mentoring is one of the most critical tools to promote retention and advancement of women in science and engineering."

AWIS mentors commit to meeting with a Girl Scout (or mentee) at least once a month for a period of six months. The goals of the program are:

- 1) Encourage students -- especially girls -- to study math and science
- 2) Give students a "real view" of science
- 3) Expose students to the "state of the art" of science
 - 4) Nurture future scientists

The AWIS mentor program will include a mix of group meetings/activities and individual meetings between mentors and students. This will give the mentors and students a chance to talk about science careers and provide students with an idea of what a typical day in the life of a woman scientist is like. Mentors may help students with basic homework, advise students on course selection and career options, as well as help students evaluate their progress.

Local College Helps Turn Students on to Science

Since 1993, Southwestern College's math and science departments have received \$650,000 in national grants, with an additional \$70,000 provided by the Southwestern College board. The money has been used to create a "Bridges to the Future" project that recruits women and members of minorities to science-degree programs.

AAAS R&D Funding Update November 7, 1997 -

In a last-minute rush to clear legislation before ending the first session of the 105th Congress, both chambers hope to resolve disputes holding up final approval of four appropriations bills for FY 1998 within the next few days. Although the unfinished appropriations bills include the budgets of major R&D funding agencies such as the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the Department of Commerce, broad funding trends for federal support for R&D in FY 1998 have become clear. Because of the balanced budget agreement and a booming economy that has boosted tax revenues far higher than anyone had expected, appropriators have dramatically increased FY 1998 discretionary spending compared to past budget plans. R&D has shared in this windfall.

In a R&D Funding Update released today and available at the URL above (in the "What's New" or "FY 1998 R&D" sections), AAAS estimates that as of November 7:

- Total federal R&D in FY 1998 stands at \$76.1 billion, \$2.8 billion or 3.9 percent more than FY 1997. All major R&D funding agencies except Transportation and Agriculture have received increases well ahead of the expected 2.5 percent inflation rate.

- The FY 1998 total is likely to be even higher when appropriations action is

- Federal support for basic research is expected to rise by at least 4.0 percent to \$15.4 billion.

More information, and a funding table, is available in the R&D Funding Update. The Update also notes other important trends in R&D, including the latest figures for industry-funded R&D, and offers an outlook for the next few weeks on the final outcome of FY 1998 appropriations.

Tomorrow's Girl: Mentors Needed

A new LA-AWIS member, Cheryl Hershey, has recently published the Tomorrow's Girl fictional series for young girls, ages 6-12. The series has been designed to meet the needs of young girls in regard to their loss of interest in science and math by the age of 12.

These paperback books feature a young girl solving mysteries or other

problems using science and technology. She assists a woman in a science or technology career or background, which provides a ready-made mentor in the supporting character. The science is uncomplicated, but quite compelling for girls (and their parents!) Moreover, the situations are fictional, but the problem-solving methods are quite real. They also include some hands-on science activities related to the story and a glossary. Most importantly, the books subtly show what can be done with science, one of the necessary drivers to keep girls interested.
