Lucie Bruijn, Ph.D., is currently a postdoctoral fellow at the Ludwig Institute, UCSD, working on mechanisms of motor neuron degeneration in Lou Gherig's disease. She completed her Ph.D. at the University of London, United Kingdom, focusing on the mechanism of degeneration in Alzheimer's disease. She received her B.S. in Pharmacy at Rhodes University, South Africa.

· Emelyn Eldredge

Emelyn Eldredge received her Bachelor's degree in Biochemistry from Mount Holyoke College in 1985 and her Ph.D. in Biochemistry from the University of Edinburgh in 1989. Her postdoctoral experiences took her to the Mayo Clinic and then the Salk Institute. In 1996 she joined Academic Press as an Acquisitions Editor for biochemistry, molecular biology, cell biology, and immunology. Her first original project at AP was to pursue the book "Alternative Careers in Science: Leaving the Ivory Tower", edited by Cynthia Robbins-Roth and due out this January. An active participant in AWIS events since 1993, Emelyn was on the Speakers Committee for 1995 AWIS conference "Women in Bioscience II: Envisioning the Future" and is currently treasurer of the San Diego chapter.

Nikou A. Hessami, DVM, Ph.D, received her doctorate degree in veterinary medicine from Tehran University and her Ph.D from the University of Nevada, Reno. Dr. Tina Kuus-Reichel has worked as a Research Scientist and Project Manager in the San Diego Biotechnology Industry for the past eleven years. Dr. Kuus held the position of Adjunct Professor of Biological Sciences at CSUSM from 1991 to 1994 where she taught Immunology. Dr. Kuus was on the Publicity Committee for the Women in Bioscience Conference in 1995 and chaired the Facilities Committee for the Women in Bioscience Conference in 1997. She is also a member of the American Association of Immunologists, AAAS and the Southern California Biotech Consortium. She has been involved in career planning and mentoring activities with young women scientists for the past several years.

• AWIS Education Outreach Committee Barbara Armstrong

The AWIS Education Outreach Committee has a number of on-going programs that will enable you to make a contribution to AWIS and at the same time develop your leadership, speaking, writing, and problem-solving skills.

The Speakers Bureau sends scientists to science classes and career fairs to talk about their research or offer science career advice. In addition to speakers, the committee also seeks volunteers to design and implement outreach to teachers in order to publicize the speakers bureau as well as establish criteria so we can evaluate the success of this program.

The Hands-on Science committee demonstrates simple, hands-on science experiments to teachers at science educator's conferences and during "science day" activities organized by schools. Volunteers are needed to demonstrate our hands-on experiments and/or to develop new experiments.

The Mentorship program pairs students with scientists. The goal is to expose students to career opportunities in science, demonstrate various research methods, and help students select appropriate classes in order to pursue their goals. Volunteers are needed as

mentors and to design methods to evaluate the first year of the program.

The internship program seeks to provide students with supervised research experience by placing them in local laboratories. This program is currently under development and requires volunteers to identify research opportunities for students.

Science Olympiad coaching of the Roosevelt Jr. High School team is a special project of the AWIS Education committee. Additional volunteers are being sought. Our coaches have already made a significant contribution to the team'sperformance.

among women in bioscience at all levels;
(2) to introduce women to the many
career opportunities that exist in
bioscience; and (3) to showcase positive
role models and highlight the
achievements of women scientists in the
San Diego area.

This year, "Women in Bioscience III: Making Connections" was co-presented by CONNECT, BIOCOM/san diego. and the Salk Institute, and was made possible by the financial contributions of 33 corporate sponsors. The conference day was proclaimed "Women in Bioscience Day" by the mayor of San Diego. Over 350 science professionals and students attended the event, which featured two keynote speakers and five workshop sessions (20 workshops total) on topics including academic and industrial research, management, business development, patent and intellectual property issues, family and career, education, and career development.

As co-chairs for the 1997 conference, we had the wonderful opportunity to meet and work with over 30 women scientists and students who enthusiastically volunteered their time and energy on the Speakers, Fundraising, Facilities, Publications, and Publicity committees. In addition, we all gained valuable exposure to the many facets of the San Diego biotechnology community by interacting with numerous people and

institutions involved in bioscience education and industry.

AWIS Represented at SPIE Conference

AWIS was represented on a panel at the recent SPIE (International Society for Optical Engineers) conference in San Diego, July 27 - August 1.

AWIS member, Frof. Karen Kavanagh from UCSD, Dept. of Electrical and Computer Engineering, was part of a panel that SPIE convened on the subject of Careers for Women in Optical Science and Technology. In addition to Karen, the panel consisted of Dr. Marjorie Meinel, Jet Propulsion Labs, and Dr. Jean Bennett, China Lake Naval Research Station, both distinguished scientists in the fields of optical engineering.

Cynthia Vernold, a Ph.D. candidate at Optical Sciences Center, U. of Arizona, Dr. Suzie Laurich-McIntyre, U. of Washington and representing WEPAN - Women in Engineering Program Advocates Network, and Tina Whittfield, representing WITI - Women in Technology International. It was moderated by Prof. Malgorzata

Kujawinska, Warsaw Univ. of Technology, and Dr. Joan Lurie, Datron/Transco Inc.

The aim of the panel was to attempt to understand, first, why there is such an underrepresentation of women in science and particularly in engineering, and second, was there anything SPIE could do to increase the participation by women in its society. Females represent only 6.2% of SPIE's 13,579 members.

In brief, there were no simple answers to either of these questions at the conclusion of the two hour session. The importance of networking and mentoring opportunities were mentioned by more than one person including Prof. Kavanagh's introduction of AWIS. There was a mixed opinion by panel members and the audience, both as to whether a glass ceiling exists for women in science. One woman from England was "shocked" that such a panel like this was deemed necessary in the "land of the free", USA. Jean Bennett and Marjorie Meinel each described their long careers two more examples of women whose careers in science beginning in the 40's proceeded primarily because of their intense enjoyment of the work, initially in the absence of official recognition or positions. Bennett did not believe there was a glass ceiling in her field. Others like the representative from WEPAN and WITI came with detailed statistics about the reduction in numbers of women going into engineering at universities and the gender gap in salaries, promotions, etc. in industry. Practical suggestions for SPIE included the importance of providing day care at a conference for parents attending, reduced membership fees for women, and mentoring opportunities.
